1. INTRODUCTION:

◆Lab tests are a valuable assessment tool. They allow the clinician a behind-the-scenes look at the functional metabolism of the patient, providing both an initial diagnosis and a benchmark for measuring the success of a treatment plan. In the world of fertility, lab tests are a common language shared by different practitioners. While the topic may at first appear complicated, with a little time and familiarity the alphabet soup begins to sort itself into a discernible pattern.

1. INTRODUCTION:

◆Let us consider what is needed on order to conceive: sperm, eggs, open fallopian tubes, and a healthy uterine environment. Age is the one factor that affects fertility for all women. The most important task of the fertility specialist is to assist patients in maximizing their window of opportunity. The ability to spot red flags in a patient's work-up will allow the practitioner to effectively guide the patient in considering the most appropriate options in a timely fashion.

1. INTRODUCTION:

Red flags include male fertility factor (poor sperm), diminished ovarian reserve (an indicator of both potential egg quantity and quality), blocked fallopian tubes, an impaired uterine environment, and any other significant metabolic or hormonal imbalances that may interfere with one's fertility.

2. TIMELINES:

- The comprehensive wellness panel is preferably done at the beginning of treatment as part of the initial work-up.
- A semen analysis is best performed as early as possible in the treatment timeline.
- The fertility workup for women is age dependent:
 At 30 years old: completed after one year of trying to
 - At 50 years old, completed after one year of trying to conceive
 - ◆ At 35 years old: completed after 6 months of trying to conceive
 - At 40 years old: completed before trying to conceive

3. TYPES OF TESTING:

- ◆ Blood (a.k.a. serum) conventional, widely used
- ◆ Saliva cost effective, suitable for tests that require several samples such as the Adrenal Stress Index
- ◆ Urine best suited for "yes" or "no" results, such as the LH (Luteinizing Hormone) surge with ovulation predictor kits, or home pregnancy tests; unable to give quantified results
- Diagnostic imaging used for hysterosalpingograms (HSG), ultrasounds (U/S), and antral follicle counts (AFC)

A NOTE ON TOTAL, PROTEIN-BOUND, AND FREE-FRACTION HORMONE LEVELS:

♦ Hormones exist in two forms in the body. At any given time, approximately 95% - 98% of a particular hormone is bound to protein, which allows it to be transported in the bloodstream. When the hormone is released from the protein, it is known as a free hormone and is now in its active state. The total refers to the combination of the protein-bound and free-fraction hormones

A NOTE ON TOTAL, PROTEIN-BOUND, AND FREE-FRACTION HORMONE LEVELS:

 With blood testing, hormones are measured as total hormones unless otherwise specified as free hormones.

A NOTE ON TOTAL, PROTEIN-BOUND, AND FREE-FRACTION HORMONE LEVELS:

 With saliva testing, all hormone levels are free-fraction hormones



NRS 353.1465 Acceptance of credit cards, debit cards and electronic transfers of money: Prerequisites; fees for use; regulations.

1. Upon approval of the State Board of Finance, a state agency may enter into contracts with issuers of credit cards or debit cards or operators of systems that provide for the electronic transfer of money to provide for the acceptance of credit cards, debit cards or electronic transfers of money by the agency:

(a) For the payment of money owed to the agency for taxes, interest, penalties or any other obligation; or

(b) In payment for goods or services.

2. Before a state agency may enter into a contract pursuant to subsection 1, the agency must submit the proposed contract to the State Treasurer for his or her review and transmittal to the State Board of Finance. The agency shall coordinate the administration of the contract with the State Treasurer to ensure that the State Treasurer is able to track and reconcile payment information pursuant to the contract.

3. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 4, if the issuer or operator charges the state agency a fee for each use of a credit card or debit card or for each electronic transfer of money, the state agency may require the cardholder or the person requesting the electronic transfer of money to pay a convenience fee when appropriate and authorized. The total convenience fees charged by the state agency in a fiscal year must not exceed the total amount of fees charged to the state agency by the issuer or operator in that fiscal year.

4. A state agency that is required to pay a fee charged by the issuer or operator for the use of a credit card or debit card or for an electronic transfer of money may, pursuant to NRS 353.148, file a claim with the Director of the Office of Finance for reimbursement of the fees paid to the issuer or operator during the immediately preceding quarter.

5. The Director of the Office of Finance shall adopt regulations providing for the submission of payments to state agencies pursuant to contracts authorized by this section. The regulations must not conflict with a regulation adopted pursuant to NRS 360.092 or 360A.020.

6. As used in this section:

(a) "Cardholder" means the person or organization named on the face of a credit card or debit card to whom or for whose benefit the credit card or debit card is issued by an issuer.

(b) "Convenience fee" means a fee paid by a cardholder or person requesting the electronic transfer of money to a state agency for the convenience of using the credit card or debit card or the electronic transfer of money to make such payment.

(c) "Credit card" means any instrument or device, whether known as a credit card or credit plate or by any other name, issued with or without a fee by an issuer for the use of the cardholder in obtaining money, property, goods, services or anything else of value on credit.

(d) "Debit card" means any instrument or device, whether known as a debit card or by any other name, issued with or without a fee by an issuer for the use of the cardholder in depositing, obtaining or transferring funds.

(e) "Electronic transfer of money" has the meaning ascribed to it in NRS 463.01473.

(f) "Issuer" means a business organization, financial institution or authorized agent of a business organization or financial institution that issues a credit card or debit card.

(Added to NRS by 1997, 1321; A 2001, 1321; 2003, 20th Special Session, 21; 2009, 1572; 2011, 2556)

NRS 353.1466 Acceptance of credit cards, debit cards and electronic transfers of money: Entry of state agency into contract; entry of Director of Office of Finance into contracts for participating state agencies; reports by state agency that fails to enter or participate in contract.

1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, a state agency shall seek and obtain the approval of the State Board of Finance to enter into a contract for the acceptance of credit cards, debit cards or electronic transfers of money pursuant to NRS 353.1465 unless it is impracticable for the agency to enter into such a contract.

2. The Director of the Office of Finance may enter into one or more contracts with issuers of credit cards or debit cards or operators of systems that provide for the electronic transfer of money to provide for the acceptance of credit cards, debit cards or electronic transfers of money by any state agency that chooses to participate in the contract. The Director must obtain approval of the State Board of Finance in the manner required pursuant to NRS 353.1465 for such a contract, and the contract is subject to the requirements of that section. If a state agency participates in such a contract, it is not required to seek and obtain approval to enter into a contract pursuant to subsection 1.

3. A state agency that has not entered into a contract pursuant to NRS 353.1465 or is not participating in a contract pursuant to subsection 2 shall report to the Legislative Commission and the Interim Finance Committee on or before July 1 of every even-numbered year concerning the reasons that the agency has failed to enter into or participate in such a contract, including any supporting financial information, and the efforts the agency is taking to allow it to enter into or participate in such a contract in the future.
